



Teeny Tiny Crochet Chains by Emma

It is Yarndale's mission to inspire creativity and share the love of yarn and the Yarndale team is passionate about encouraging people to start a new skill or have a go at something different.

Emma's crochet pattern will help you create teeny, tiny, woolly chains reminiscent of paper chains many of us used to (and maybe still do) make. If you need extra support,

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Stitches used in this pattern. UK terms throughout.

- **ch** (**chain**) Yarn over and pull through loop on the hook. Creates a chain.
- **tr** (**treble**) Yarn over. Insert hook through stitch, yarn over and pull the loop back through the stitch. You will have 3 loops on your hook. Yarn over and pull through 2 loops on your hook. Yarn over again and pull through the remaining 2 loops.

Using a 4mm hook and any DK yarn. Emma uses a Yarndale Learn to Crochet kit which has 100g of Scheepjes Softfun yarn.

First Row: ch 18 (chain 18)

Second Row:

Starting in 3rd chain from hook work 1 tr into each chain stitch (16 tr in total). Fasten off and use yarn tails to join into the first link for your crochet chain.

For your second chain link make sure you loop through your first chain link before using yarn tails to join into a chain link. Otherwise you'll end up with lots of separate links.
