

## Blanket of Hope by Emma

It is Yarndale's mission to inspire creativity and share the love of yarn and the Yarndale team is passionate about encouraging people to start a new skill or have a go at something different.

## Stitches used in this pattern. UK terms throughout.

- sl st (slip stitch) - This is used to join new yarn. Usually at the start of a round. Insert hook into where you are going to slip and yarn over then pull the loop back through the stitch (or chain space) and pull the loop through the loop on your hook.
- ch (chain) - Yarn over and pull through loop on the hook. Creates a chain.
- dc (double) - Insert hook through stitch, yarn over and pull the loop back through the stitch. You will have 2 loops on your hook. Yarn over and pull through both loops on your hook.
- $\quad \mathbf{t r}$ (treble) - Yarn over. Insert hook through stitch, yarn over and pull the loop back through the stitch. You will have 3 loops on your hook. Yarn over and pull through 2 loops on your hook. Yarn over again and pull through the remaining 2 loops.

The Blanket of Hope uses our Classic Granny Square pattern, a 4 mm hook and one strand each of Barbara and Hope held double throughout.

To make a blanket 14 squares by 14 squares you will need 5 balls of Barbara and 5 balls of Hope and 2 balls of Geilsk Bomuld Og Uld in orange.

The finished blanket is $110 \mathrm{~cm} \times 110 \mathrm{~cm}$ and each granny square measures $7 \mathrm{~cm} \times 7 \mathrm{~cm}$.

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## The Granny Squares

## First Square:

## To start:

Make a slip knot and chi. Join to make a circle.

## Round 1:

In this round you will be working into the middle of the chain circle.
$\mathbf{5 c h}$ then $\mathbf{3} \mathbf{t r}$, $\mathbf{2 c h}$ into the chain circle 3 times. $\mathbf{2} \mathbf{t r}$ and join with a si st into the space between starting $\mathbf{5 c h}$ and first $\mathbf{3 t r}$ cluster.

## Round 2:

$\mathbf{5 c h}$ then $\mathbf{3 t r}$ into the same corner space. $\boldsymbol{*} \mathbf{1} \mathbf{c h}$. In next 2 ch corner space $\mathbf{3} \mathbf{t r}$, $\mathbf{2 c h}$, 3 tr* Repeat ** 2 times. 1 ch, then $\mathbf{2 t r}$ into the first corner of this round next to the starting ch. Join with a sld st into the corner space created by the 5 ch .

## Round 3:

$\mathbf{5 c h}$ then $\mathbf{3} \mathbf{t r}$ into the same corner space. $\mathbf{*} \mathbf{1} \mathbf{c h}$. In next ch space $\mathbf{3} \mathbf{t r}$ then $\mathbf{1} \mathbf{c h}$.
In next 2ch corner space $\mathbf{3 t r}$, 2 ch, 3 tr*
Repeat ** 2 times. 1ch, then $\mathbf{3 t r}$ in next ch space, $\mathbf{1} \mathbf{c h}$ then $\mathbf{2 t r}$ into the first corner of this round next to the starting 5 ch . Join with a sld st into the corner space created by the ch and fasten off.


- Chain Stich (ch)
- Slip Stitch (ss)
$\mp$ Treble Crochet (tr)

## Second Square:

The blanket is constructed using the Join As You Go (JAYG) method as described below. If you are new to this method you may find our video on Yarndale Official YouTube channel helpful.

## To start:

Make a slip knot and ch4. Join to make a circle.

## Round 1:

In this round you will be working into the middle of the chain circle.
$\mathbf{5 c h}$ then $\mathbf{* 3 t r}$, 2ch* into the chain circle 3 times. $\mathbf{2 t r}$ and join with a sl st into the space between starting 5 ch and first 3 tr cluster.

## Round 2:

$\mathbf{5 c h}$ then $\mathbf{3 t r}$ into the same corner space. *1 $\mathbf{c h}$. In next 2 ch corner space $\mathbf{3} \mathbf{t r}$, $\mathbf{2 c h}$, 3tr* Repeat ** 2 times. $\mathbf{1} \mathbf{c h}$, then $\mathbf{2 t r}$ into the first corner of this round next to the starting ch5. Join with a sl st into the corner space created by the 5 ch .

## Round 3:

$\mathbf{5 c h}$ then $\mathbf{3} \mathbf{t r}$ into the same corner space. *1 ch.
In next ch space $3 \mathbf{t r}$ then $\mathbf{1 c h}$. In next 2 ch corner space $\mathbf{3 t r}, \mathbf{1} \mathbf{c h}$, $\mathbf{s l}$ st into any corner of the first square (see photo 1a).
$3 \mathbf{t r}$ in same corner space of second square
 (see photo 1b). sl st in next ch space of first square.

3tr in next ch space of second square. $\mathbf{s l} \mathbf{~ s t}$ in next ch space of first square. $3 \mathbf{t r}$ in corner space of second square and $\mathbf{1} \mathbf{c h}$ then $\mathbf{s l} \mathbf{s t}$ in corner of first square. 3tr in same corner space of second square.


Complete second granny square as follows: $\mathbf{1 c h}$. In next ch space $\mathbf{3} \mathbf{t r}$ then $\mathbf{1 c h}$.
In next 2 ch corner space $\mathbf{3 t r}$, 2ch, $\mathbf{3 t r}$.
$\mathbf{1 c h}$, then $\mathbf{3 t r}$ in next ch space, $\mathbf{1} \mathbf{c h}$ then $\mathbf{2 t r}$ into the first corner of this round next to the starting 5 ch . Join with a sl st into the corner space created by the ch5 and fasten off.


## Third Square:

## Follow instructions for second square.



## Fourth Square:

The only difference here is where you need to join into a corner where the 4 squares meet. You sl st into second square and sl st into third square and don't do a 1ch (see below).


## Border

The border is 6 rounds of simple linen stitch with a delicate scalloped edge as follows.

## Round 1

The first round is crocheted using the plain coloured Geilsk yarn held double (equivalent of a DK yarn when held double).
Starting in any corner join the plain coloured yarn with a sl st and work 1dc into the top of each tr and ch space around your blanket. In the 4 corners work $\mathbf{2 d c}, \mathbf{2 c h}$,
2dc in the corner space.
sl st to join at the end and fasten off.

## Round 2

Using Barbara and Hope held double start in any corner and join with a sl st.
*1ch, miss one dc from Round 1 then $\mathbf{1 d c}$ into the top of the next dc from Round 1 .* Repeat ** along the side of your blanket.
In the 4 corners work $\mathbf{2 d c}$, $\mathbf{2 c h}, \mathbf{2 d c}$ in the corner space.
sl st to join at the end and fasten off.

## Round 3

Using your plain yarn start in any corner and join with a sl st.
*1 ch, $\mathbf{1 d c}$ into the ch space between the dcs of Round 2. *
Repeat ** along the side of your blanket.
In the 4 corners work $\mathbf{2 d c}$, $\mathbf{2 c h}, \mathbf{2 d c}$ in the corner space.
sl st to join at the end and fasten off.

## Rounds 4 \& 5

Using Barbara and Hope held double start in any corner and join with a sl st.
*1 ch, $\mathbf{1} \mathbf{d c}$ into the ch space between the dcs of previous round. *
Repeat ** along the side of your blanket.
In the 4 corners work $\mathbf{2 d c} \mathbf{~} \mathbf{2 c h}, \mathbf{2 d c}$ in the corner space.
sl st to join at the end and fasten off.

## Round 6

Using your plain yarn start in any corner and join with a sl st.
*1 ch, $\mathbf{1 d c}$ into the ch space between the dcs of previous round. *
Repeat ** along the side of your blanket.
In the 4 corners work $\mathbf{2 d c} \mathbf{2} \mathbf{2 c h}, \mathbf{2 d c}$ in the corner space.
sl st to join at the end and DO NOT fasten off.

## Round 7

For your scalloped edge continue in your plain yarn as follows.
$\mathbf{1 c h}, \mathbf{3 d c}$ in the first ch space along the edge of your blanket, sl st in the next ch space.
*3dc in the next ch space then sl st in the next ch space*.
Repeat ** along the side of your blanket.
In the 4 corners work $\mathbf{1 d c}, \mathbf{2 c h}, \mathbf{1 d c}$ in the corner space.
sl st to join at the end and fasten off.


Weave in all ends.
The weight and drape of the yarn probably means that your Blanket of Hope won't need blocking.
