



Yarndale Make Along with Emma Yarndale Nigel Wrist Warmers

Emma's knitting pattern will help you create some cosy Wrist Warmers that will fit most hands.

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Materials Required

25cm 3mm circular knitting needle 3mm dpn needles 100g ball of 4ply sock wool

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Part One: Cast On

Using one of your dpns cast on 52 stitches (sts).

Part Two: Cuff

Using your circular needle work the first row of the rib. K2, P2 Join the round being careful not to twist the sts and continue K2, P2 rib for 10 rounds (Or I like to rib until the end of 3 colour stripes.).

Part Three: Knit

Just knit round and round for 40 rounds. I finished at the end of a colour stripe and knitted a total of 10 colour stripes.

Part Four: Thumb Hole

To make the thumb hole you will need to knit onto dpns and work backwards and forwards in stocking stitch for the next 11 rows as follows:

R1: sl1P then P51. Turn your work.

R2: sl1P then K51. Turn your work.

Repeat R1 and R2 for 11 rows (or 3 colour stripes, if like me you like to finish at the end of a colour). Make sure you finish at the end of a R1 so that when you turn your work you will be ready to knit again.

Part Five: Hand

Knit back onto your circular needle and join to knit in the round again. Knit for 16 rounds or 4 colour stripes.

Part Six: Cuff

As Part 2 knit a rib pattern of K2, P2 for 10 rounds or 3 colour stripes.

Part Seven: Cast Off and sew in ends.
